Recognising Achievements and Promoting Inclusivity

The Celebration of Innovation in the North of Tyne, hosted by the National Innovation Centre for Ageing's Internet of Caring Things (IoCT) programme, brought together entrepreneurs, judges, and supporters to showcase advancements in the healthy ageing and longevity markets.

Opening Keynote: Ammar Mirza's Inspiring Journey

Following the keynote, a panel session featuring judges Ammar Mirza CBE, Michael Dickens, Tracy Clarkson, and Antony Nicholson explored the state of innovation in the North East. The consensus was clear — the region's strength lies in its people, passion, and historical leadership in UK innovation, even if the landscape has evolved from industrial to more grassroots efforts.

Pitching: IoCT-Supported Companies Shine

Ten companies supported by the IoCT programme had the opportunity to pitch their innovations. The diversity of sectors represented showcased the programme's broad impact on the healthy ageing and longevity markets. Winners included Fiona Surrey from Flying High Digital Academy (Healthy Longevity Award), Neil Herron from Grid Smarter Cities (Healthy Planet Award), and Louise Thompson from Myfolks, securing the Voice's Choice award.

Innovative Solutions: Cross-Sector Longevity Market Impact

The pitching companies reflected the cross-sector diversity of the Longevity market. Flying High Digital Academy focuses on digital adoption by teaching user-centric technology use. Grid Smarter Cities addresses logistical challenges in caregiving through digital parking permissions. Myfolks aims to provide proactive care through its compassionate concierge service.

Beyond the pitches, the event facilitated valuable connections. Judges provided insights, and attendees, including providers and suppliers, offered advice and promised introductions. The atmosphere encouraged mutual support and potential partnerships, emphasising the collaborative spirit in the North of Tyne's innovation ecosystem.
